This review has been completed based on the information provided at the time of writing, it is acknowledged that as information becomes available, the content and conclusions of this report may change.

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1. Patient Details and Injuries

35-year-old Leanne, suffered from I&S She was managed presumably at the Casualty Collection Point (CCP), before being transferred to Aintree Hospital.

2. Chronology for Patient

A simple chronology for the arrival of NWS resources and interventions related to Leanne can be seen in table 1:

Leanne was managed and triaged on the arrival of the first NWS resources. She was subsequently transferred to hospital later in the incident.

3. Overview; Clinical Interventions

Leanne was managed on scene by NWS clinicians; however, it is unclear whether she received any interventions above dressing her wound.

The transporting crew administered oxygen to Leanne, however, undertook no further observations or interventions as they report their vehicle had limited equipment on board, as it had been used to treat patients on the incident ground. She is documented to have a chest seal in situ and a dressing applied to the wound on her arm.

4. Overview; Treatment Plan

The treatment plan for Leanne appears to have centred around initial triage and management of injuries, followed by transport to hospital once an appropriate resource has become available.

Leanne has had limited interventions documented and performed en-route to hospital, as there was a limited availability of equipment and medications.

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5. Missed Opportunities

There are clear missed opportunities to manage Leanne appropriately, she has had limited clinical interventions and no documented analgesia or tranexamic acid administration. However, time to arrival at definitive care is well within the window for effective TXA administration.

There are documented concerns with the ability to pass a pre-alert message to Aintree Hospital by the crew, it is unknown why communications failed at this point.

6. Summary

Leanne has received some interventions for her injuries, including application of chest seals and the dressing of her wounds. There is limited information however to support her receiving any tranexamic acid and analgesia, with reported issues in the equipment available on the transporting ambulance.

Whilst the time taken for her to be transported to hospital may be higher than that expected in an isolated incident, in the context of this incident and requirement to triage and manage resource, this timeframe is appropriate.

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
