- 18 different vendors?

- 3 Q. He did so, you tell us in paragraph 64, in his own name.
- 4 Again, using the "megalania" email address?
- 5 A. Correct.
- 6 Q. But this time the IP address was different and was it
- 7 one that was associated with a VPN?
- 8 A. That is correct. It was, yes.
- 9 Q. So, trying to disguise his location?
- 10 **A.** It would appear so, despite the delivery address being
- 11 his home address.
- 12 Q. Thank you.

- 24 order, is this right, for two knives from Amazon of
- 25 exactly the same make and brand as the one that he just

- data either, so we were not able to progress it any

- 14 SIR ADRIAN FULFORD: So Amazon said to you that they didn't
- 15 have the information that Mr Moss has just asked you
- 16 about?
- 17 **A.** Yes.
- 18 **SIR ADRIAN FULFORD:** Thank you.
- 19 MR MOSS: I think I do you a disservice: you asked those
- 20 questions but you got a blank?
- 21 A. Yes.
- 22 MR MOSS: Again, that's something we can pick up with
- 23 Amazon.
- 24 SIR ADRIAN FULFORD: Please.
- 25 MR MOSS: Thank you. Then paragraph 69, please -- perhaps

- 1 we should pick it up at 68. Again, the electronic
- 2 devices show that there was a delivery confirmation
- 3 email to AR, is that right, "Your package has been
- 4 delivered!", and that message was delivered at 5.41 in
- 5 the afternoon on the 15th.
- 6 A. That is correct, yes.
- 7 Q. Thank you. Were you able to establish anything about8 the age verification process at the point of delivery?
- 9 A. No, we weren't, so as I just explained --
- 10 Q. That is the Condor request that you made?
- 11 A. It was, yes.
- 12 Q. Thank you.

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You say in paragraph 69 that two Apollo knives, therefore, had been delivered to AR's home at about that time, and we can pick it up in doorbell footage and matters of that kind.

But images of the knife associated with this order, you say, were compared with an image of a knife recovered from the Hart Space that appeared to have been used in the attack and they appeared identical; is that correct?

- 22 A. That is correct, yes.
- 23 Q. If we turn to your paragraph 76, which we will remember
- from yesterday is the very useful paragraph in your
- 25 statement where you bring together where items were
- 1 mother on it?
- 2 A. It did, yes.
- 3 Q. Would it be fair to say, though, that you are not able
- 4 to determine when the finger was applied to that
- 5 packaging, all you know is that the mother had touched
- 6 it?
- 7 A. That is correct.
- 8 Q. Sir, for obvious reasons, I don't intend to bring up
- 9 imagery of the knives but the imagery supporting the
- 10 questions I have just asked are in our disclosure,

- 14 SIR ADRIAN FULFORD: For 76(f), the Cerbera knife packaging,
- 15 you presumably weren't able to say which of the two
- 16 knives that packaging related to or could you say?
- 17 A. No, I wouldn't be able to say, sir.
- 18 SIR ADRIAN FULFORD: Thank you.
- 19 MR MOSS: Thank you. If we just stick with 76 and look at
- 20 76(h), finally, in the question of knives. You indicate
- 21 there that a 14-centimetre kitchen knife -- so
- 22 a different knife -- was found in the bathroom. Do you
- 23 recall that being part of the things found in the --
- 24 A. Yes, I do recall that, yes.
- 25 **Q.** Can you help us any more in relation to that? Was that

- 12 **A.** Yes.
- 13 Q. I think you will be aware -- I don't need to bring it up
 14 on screen but, sir, the reference is MERP001217 -- that
- Dion R, AR's brother, during the investigation said that on Monday, 29 July, at about 11.15, AR left the house:

- 25 packaging was found to have the fingerprints of AR's

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- 1 a knife that could, in any sense, be attributed to AR or
- 2 did it appear to be a knife that perhaps was part of the
- 3 process of hiding knives from AR elsewhere in the house;
- 4 were you able to form a view on that?
- A. No, we didn't form any view as to why that was in thebathroom, other than it being an unusual place.
- 7 Q. Thank you.

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So that brings us to the end, I think, of the questioning that I had in relation to AR's online purchases, both what is known physically about them and from the digital media.

I want to come now to issues about the digital devices and you will remember that yesterday you assisted us with what the digital devices showed about AR's online activity on the day and I now want to explore what they show about his previous online activity.

Can we pick that up, please, in paragraph 53 of your statement. To a large extent, we have covered much of this ground but it is useful just to remind ourselves of the two tablets. So SMG/3, the older of the two --

- 22 A. Yes, that is correct.
- Q. -- and SMG/2, the newer one, that was purchased on
 9 October 2023, according to a receipt that was found on
- 25 it?

- 1 A. That was our assessment, yes.
- 2 Q. You indicate there that, once AR had SMG/2, that was the
- 3 main device that he used but he still used his older
- 4 tablet, to a lesser degree?
- 5 A. He did, yes.
- 6 Q. In terms of the recovery of those tablets, they were
- 7 both found in the home; is that right?
- 8 A. They was, yes.
- 9 Q. In general terms, was there any indication that other
- 10 family members used those tablets or did they just seem
- 11 to be AR's?
- 12 A. They appeared to be AR's from the forensic testing that
- 13 we did and from what the family told us.
- 14 Q. Thank you. Turning then to SMG/2, the more recent of
- the tablets, paragraph 70 on page 19, please. So, you
- 16 provide a long list of pdf documents which were found to
- 17 have been on this tablet. Can you help just with this:
- were these document titles only that were available or
- 19 were some of these capable of having been recovered as
- 20 documents themselves?
- 21 A. Some of them was -- yes, there is a mixture of both.
- 22 Some of them were documents and some of them were
- 23 titles.
- 24 Q. Thank you. Does that explain why in the disclosure we
- 25 have some of these full documents but others all that we
 - 13

- 3 Q. Thank you. You indicate, by listing them, the general
 - nature of them, and I don't intend to read them all, but
- 5 would it be right to say that, in general terms, the
- 6 titles are suggestive of violence, an interest in

- 8 Chechnya, the Rwanda genocide, punishment dealt to slave
- 9 rebels, the Zulu war, the fight against Isis in Mosul
- and things of that kind, as well as a book on ninja.
- 11 A. That is correct, a real mixture.
- 12 Q. We will come to a similar list with a few particular
- documents that I want to draw out from the other tablet
- in a moment. But what conclusions did you draw overall,
- 15 what assessment overall did you draw about the type of
- materials that appear to have been downloaded?
- 17 A. AR clearly had an interest in numerous wars, violence.
- The family did say that he was interested in studying in
- 19 history but the majority of these were quite extreme in
- 20 the title or in the material that was found within them.
- 21 Q. Thank you. So, within these materials, I think that it
- is right to say that some would be of a form of academic
- 23 textbook?
- 24 A. That is right, yes.
- 25 Q. But even those academic textbooks tended to be dealing
 - 1.
- 1 described as an Islamist attack, is it right that the
- 2 anti-Islamic material on AR's device, first of all, was

- 18 A. Correct.
- 19 Q. And that there was extreme violence including torture?
- 20 A. That is correct, yes, there was.
- 21 Q. In relation to that, is it right that some of the
- 22 imagery appears to have related to historical acts of
- 23 torture?

- 15 A. No, we believe AR alone had been using it.
- 16 Q. We dealt with the deletion of the browser history and
- 17 the difficulties that that created, I asked you about
- 18 that yesterday, and that, although steps were taken to
- 19 recover what could be recovered, that material wasn't
- 20 very helpful. I think of the material that was found on
- 21 that, you can just confirm that there were stock images
- 22 of knives, hammers, black-coloured rucksacks, appearing
- 23 to date from around October 2020, I think, found on that
- 24 device?
- 25 **A**. That is right, yes.

- 1 come onto the timing in a moment, but we have seen --
- 2 I'm going to look at one particular early example -- but
- 3 we have seen concerning activity from the summer of 2021
- 4 onwards. To what extent did you have sight of his early
- 5 online activity from before that sort of time?
- 6 A. There was a couple of USB sticks that we were able to
- 7 obtain that contained some older material, but that
- 8 would appear to be more educational than what it was,
- 9 sort of more graphic as we found in his internet
- 10 searches. It was limited as to what we found before the
- 11 Al-Qaeda download on SMG/3 in August 2021.
- 12 Q. Thank you. Just to pick up on one detail, could we have
- on the screen, please, MERP000474. This is a record of 13 14 the examination of a hard drive, JLC5, which was seized
- 15 on 13 August from AR's bedroom and, as we see here in
- 16 the extraction summary, "Hard drive recovered from 10
- 17 Old School Close", in the bedroom that was AR's and
- 18 shows documents, graphics, videos, audio. If we can
- 19 just go over the page, please. I think we can see in
- 20 relation to 10 June -- could that just be expanded
- 21 a little -- that this was a Word document in which AR
- was looking at the chemicals needed for nitrocellulose 22 23 and dealing, towards the bottom of the page, with
- 24 affixing a blasting cap to a test tube, putting it
- 25 together with duct tape and matters of that kind, acid

- 1 used to make it and the chemicals needed.
- 2 So that appears to be a deliberately made Word
- 3 document by AR in relation to explosives, as early as
- 4 June 2021; would you agree?
- 5 A. Yes, we assessed them as three self-generated documents.
- 6 Q. Self-generated documents?
- 7 A. Yes, created by someone.
- 8 Q. Created by somebody?
- 9 **A.** Yes.
- 10 Q. So not necessarily written but, as a Word document,
- 11 nevertheless on his hard drive?
- 12 **A.** Yes.
- 13 Q. Was that, in fact, in terms of documents that you could
- 14 date and say specifically "That is an AR-related
- document which we can ascribe to a date", is that the
- 16 earliest specific document that you could date of
- 17 material of concern?
- 18 A. I wouldn't be able to comment on the actual date of it.
- 19 $\,$ Q. But, in any event, this, I think, being June 2021, is
- 20 slightly before the Al-Qaeda material?
- 21 A. Yes.
- 22 Q. Thank you. Just in terms of putting this in context of
- some evidence that we will hear later in the Inquiry,
- I think you will be aware in general terms that the last
- of the Prevent referrals was closed on 10 May 2021?
 - 25
- 1 indicated that the Range School broke up, just gone
- 2 midday, so a half school day, on 22 July; is that right?
- 3 A. That is right, yes.
- 4 Q. I think your investigation included dealing with the
- 5 teaching staff there who made you aware that the
- 6 breaking up day was publicly available from the school?
- 7 A. He did, yes.
- 8 Q. Then paragraph 102 from your investigation and your
- 9 dealings with One Call Taxis, you were able to find
- 10 that, first of all, there was a call to the automated
- 11 booking system on 22 July from AR's mobile phone, is
- 12 that right, on that day?
- 13 A. That is correct, yes.
- 14 Q. Over the page. There was first, I think, a failed call
- 15 at 12.20?
- 16 **A.** Yes.
- 17 **Q**. Then paragraph 104, a further call from the number
- 18 associated with the Nokia phone. The automated system
- 19 that we have heard about from you in relation to the
- 20 attack on the 29th, and the caller, AR, when asked his
- 21 name says "Er ... Simon".
- 22 A. That is correct, yes.
- 23 Q. That brings us back, doesn't it, to when he used the
- 24 same system on the 29th, recognising him and thinking
- 25 that it was someone called Simon?

A. Yes.

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- 2 Q. So the specific materials that I have been taking you
- 3 to, with dates attached and the purchases, I think did
 - start thereafter, insofar as the investigation was able
- 5 to find them?
- 6 A. That is correct, yes.
- 7 Q. Was your investigation aware in general terms, however,
- 8 that there were concerns, even before that time, as to
- 9 what AR had been looking at online, at least in his
- 10 schools?
- 11 A. Yes. I was aware very, very early on within the
- 12 investigation.
- 13 Q. That, in itself, as we will hear, formed part of the
- 14 Prevent referrals?
- 15 A. Yes.

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- 16 Q. Thank you.
- 17 I want to come next, please, moving away from the
 - digital material, to the events of 22 July. You start
- 19 this in paragraph 100 of your statement, please. So
- 20 back in MERP007551 at page 29.
 - You helpfully remind us of the context for this. So
- 22 2019, AR was excluded from the Range High School and he
- 23 then, in December 2019 went back to that school, having
- been excluded from it, and assaulted a pupil.
 - Then moving forward to July 2024. You have
 - 26
- 1 A. Correct. We covered that yesterday.
- 2 Q. When then asked for the pick-up location, AR gave his
- 3 home address but his destination he stated was Range
- 4 High School in Formby?
- 5 A. Yes.
- 6 Q. You obtained evidence from Mr Evanson of One Call Taxis?
- 7 A. Yes.
- 8 Q. He co-operated with your inquiry?
- 9 A. He did, yes. Our attention was brought to that from the
- Nokia phone, which we recovered from the scene, so we
- 11 had that information by the Tuesday when we spoke to the
- 12 taxi driver.
- 13 Q. Thank you. You set out the essence of what Evanson told
- you about the 22nd in your paragraph 106, so just
- dealing with that. He recalls arriving there at about
- 16 12.30 but you were able to establish from the Ring
- doorbell footage that it was a bit later, at 12.45?
- 18 **A.** Yes.
- 19 Q. "A boy came out of the house ..."
- 20 We can safely assume it is AR, so AR came out of the
- 21 house, "hood up ... Covid-style mask on", similar to the
- 22 29th?
- 23 **A.** Yes.
- 24 Q. Got into the rear of the taxi and, in addition to having
- 25 stated on the automated system "Range High School", no

- 1 doubt about it because he repeated it to Mr Evanson, the
- 2 taxi driver?
- 3 A. Correct.
- 4 Q. As the driver is about to set-off, I think he told your
- 5 investigation that a man came running out of the house
- 6 and I don't think there's going to be any dispute that
- 7 that was Alphonse R, AR's father?
- 8 A. That is correct and that was captured on the Ring
- 9 doorbell.
- 10 Q. Thank you. As the taxi driver explained it to your
- 11 investigation, is this right, AR's father was pleading
- 12 with the taxi driver "Don't take him, don't take him",
- 13 and AR was saying in response, "I'm 18, I wanna go, take
- 14 me".
- 15 A. Yes.
- 16 Q. An argument was going on. Was that an argument between
- 17 AR and his father?
- 18 A. It was, yes, but it appeared to be almost through the
- 19 taxi driver.
- 20 Q. Thank you. The taxi driver didn't want to get in the
- 21 middle of a domestic and so told AR that he would not be
- able to take him, and you summarise that the taxi driver
- 23 described AR as calm and stated that he got out of the
- 24 taxi without an issue when he, the taxi driver, had
- asked him to do so?
- 29
- 1 asked me about the knives on the 15th, that would
- 2 suggest that AR wasn't aware that morning that it was
- 3 finishing until he asked his father.
- 4 Q. Thank you. So that may suggest that the knives had been
- 5 bought as part of a general proclivity, rather than as
- 6 a part of a targeted attack on the Range?
- 7 A. Correct.
- 8 Q. Unless this was a form of false naivety on AR's part and
- 9 he was just getting confirmation?
- 10 A. Correct, that is right, as well, yeah.
- 11 Q. Then paragraph 109, still recounting Alphonse R's
- 12 account. At some stage after midday, his father said
- 13 that he realised that AR had called a taxi -- you say
- 14 that he didn't state how he realised that and that's
- something we will pick up with him -- if he knew that AR
 was planning to go to the Range High School, you comment
- that his father didn't state how he realised that, and
- 18 that Alphonse R stated that he called the taxi company
- 19 but they would not confirm whether a taxi had been
- 20 booked to his address or not?
- 21 A. That is right.
- 22 Q. That's something we will pick up in evidence with One
- 23 Call Taxis later this week. Then the taxi, as
- 24 Mr Evanson as we now know it was, arrived and AR's
- 25 father recounts he got in the back with his rucksack,

- 1 A. Yes.
- 2 Q. The visual imagery of all of this, I think you can
- 3 confirm, is captured on Ring doorbell footage?
- 4 A. It is, yes.
- 5 Q. The taxi driver then raised that he had had to travel
- 6 out from Southport to do the pick up and AR's father
- 7 gave the taxi driver £5 to seek to cover that; is that
- 8 right?
- 9 A. Correct.
- 10 Q. Then at 107, you detail that Alphonse R, AR's father,
- 11 explained about this day during the course of your
- 12 investigation at 108, so dealing now with Alphonse R's
- 13 account of this. AR had been at home with Alphonse, and
- 14 Alphonse -- he explains that AR was wearing the green
- hoodie, so I think exactly the same clothing, I think,
- as the 29th, in terms of the hoodie?
- 17 A. Yes.
- 18 Q. He -- AR that is -- asked his father when the Range
- 19 School broke up for the summer, and Alphonse looked on
- 20 his phone and saw that it was the last day of term that
- 21 day. Alphonse made a comment to the effect of, "They'll
- all be going off to university now", to which AR replied
- with words to the effect of, "Well, I won't be, will I?"
- 24 Is that right?
- 25 A. That is correct. And it's that line as to why, when you

- 1 and Alphonse R, I think, told your investigation what's
- 2 visible in the footage, that he went out and, consistent
- 3 with what the taxi driver said, pleaded with the taxi
- 4 driver not to take AR, with the taxi driver eventually
- 5 agreeing and AR being told to get out of the taxi?
- 6 A. That is correct, yes.
- 7 Q. In terms of what happened thereafter -- so they are both
- 8 out on the street at that stage, the taxi driver is
- 9 being paid off -- what then happened?
- 10 A. AR got out of the taxi, he went back into the house,
- 11 shut the door and Alphonse stayed outside.
- 12 Q. Did Alphonse stay outside for some considerable time?
- 13 A. Did he what?
- 14 Q. Stay outside for some considerable time?
- 15 A. He did, he contacted AR's mother, who came home from
- work and I believe they stayed outside until a time that
- 17 the mother would have returned and they went back into
- the house as if nothing had happened.
- 19 Q. Thank you.
- 20 Sir, the videos in relation to this are available --
- 21 but please don't bring them up on screen -- but they are
- 22 available for you, sir, at MERP006461 through to
- 23 MERP006468.
- 24 SIR ADRIAN FULFORD: Thank you.
- 25 MR MOSS: But because they show AR in the hoodie, and so on,

1 we are not going to play them.

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If we go to your paragraph 114 -- 113 perhaps we should pick it up at first, bottom of the page, 31 -- what did your investigation conclude then as to the events of the 22nd and the apparent intention of AR?

- We believe, when you take all the information into consideration, the fact that he had previously been at that asked, there had been a hully at that asked had.
- that school, there had been a bully at that school he had had issues with, he had previously been to the
- school with a knife in a bag and attacked a pupil there,

 19 Alphonse R had called the police --
- 20 A. He didn't, no.
- 21 Q. -- or later informed the police about this, other than
- 22 during the investigation?
- 23 A. Yes, that is correct.
- ${\bf 24}~{\bf Q}.~{\bf Nor}~{\bf did}~{\bf Alphonse}~{\bf R}~{\bf claim}~{\bf to}~{\bf you},$ when he spoke to you in
- 25 the investigation or to your team in the investigation,
 - 33
- 1 an occasion when a parcel was delivered to the family
 - home, he was asked to sign for it because it contained
- 3 knives, and he told your investigators that he signed
- 4 for it but did not give the parcel to AR. That broadly
- 5 tallies with the find on the top of the wardrobe in the
- 6 parent's bedroom; would you agree?
- 7 A. That is correct, with a knife and sharpening stone.
- 8 **Q.** With the possible exception that the item might more
- 9 normally be described as a machete, rather than a knife?
- 10 A. That's right, yes.
- 11 Q. In addition to that, I think, Alphonse R did explain to
- 12 your investigators that on the same day, 22 July, as the
- 13 taxi booked to the Range School, that it was on that day
- 14 that, what I think he would suggest was a rare
- 15 occurrence, when he was able to get into AR's room, and
- 16 Alphonse R saw a number of items on that occasion,
- 17 including the containers, for example, that were later
- 18 found to contain ricin. Do you recall that?
- 19 A. Yes. He admitted that he had touched the alcohol that
- 20 was in his room at that point, on which his fingerprint
- 21 was also found on the alcohol bottle.
- 23 had been outside with the taxi driver and I think you

whether they shared AR's mindset and proclivities

towards violence and the use of weapons.

14 A. Yes

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- 15 Q. They told you that and Alphonse R had described to your
 investigators incidents where AR took a knife into
 school for about a week. I think that tallies with the
 Childline incident?
- 19 A. That is correct, yes.
- Q. And another incident where he went to school with
 a knife taken from the family's kitchen, which, as you
 say in your paragraph 116, tallies with the December
- 23 2019 Range School attack?
- 24 **A.** Yes
- 25 Q. He also described to investigators in your team

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- 1 A. Yes.
- 2 **Q.** In addition to that, as you dealt with in your
- 3 paragraph 117, as we will come to in later evidence, the
- 4 Child and Adolescent Mental Health Services, CAMHS, had
- 5 advised AR's parents to remove knives from the address
- 6 or secure them?
- 7 A. That is right, there were numerous references within the8 third-party material.
- 9 Q. So all of that, and there's more as well, gives rise to
- issues that this Inquiry will explore about the extent
 of AR's parents' knowledge and the adequacy of steps
- of AR's parents' knowledge and the adequacy of stell that they took in response. But did you, in the
- 13 investigation, find any evidence at all that AR's
- parents, in any form, sympathised with violent attacks
- 15 or had that mindset?
- 16 **A.** We didn't, no. It is fair to say they must have known
- of the weapons but we didn't find anything to suggest at
- all that they sympathised with him.
- 19 Q. In terms of online activity, AR's fascination and
- 20 interest in torture, extreme violence, Nazi Germany,
- 21 matters of that kind, did you find any evidence across
- the family devices, because obviously lots of items were
- 23 seized, did you find any evidence at all that AR's
- 24 parents shared an interest in extreme violence, matters
- 25 of that kind?

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- A. We didn't. We obtained hundreds of thousands of
 messages, more or less from the mother's phone, but
 there was nothing to suggest that they shared that level
 of violence at all.
 - Q. Thank you.

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Now, the upshot, of course, of the investigation was the convictions of AR, of which the Chair is, by now, extremely familiar and I don't need to go on to deal with in detail.

But I want to just ask you a few more questions about AR's ideology and his motivation.

When seen as a whole, did you find evidence that AR's actions were motivated by any ideological cause, whether political or religious or racial?

- A. We didn't and that was under constant review, as well,
 from the head of the counter-terrorism police, who
 actually made that decision. It was not us who would
 make that decision, it would be them and we didn't find
 anything. As you pointed out, there was quite a lot of
 anti-Islamic material as well.
- Q. Thank you. So although we know of AR's conviction of
 a terrorism offence because he possessed the research
 paper with the Al-Qaeda material in it, would it be fair
 to say that, seen as a whole, that there was no evidence
 that AR subscribed to an extreme form of Islam or indeed

a fascination with violence and inappropriate material but not somebody who was motivated by any particular religion, racial hatred or matters of that kind?

A. That is correct, and I must say I'm grateful to Counter
 Terrorism Policing for the support that they gave us all
 the way through. It did allow us to expedite some of
 the inquiries that we did.

MR MOSS: Thank you.

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DCI Pye, thank you very much for the evidence you have given, you have given a very lengthy and helpful statement and evidence over a long period of time. I should just give you the opportunity if there are any matters that I haven't covered that you think it may be important for this Inquiry to hear?

15 A. If I could, and you wouldn't mind just maybe the extentof the investigation.

Obviously it was quite over a lengthy period, would that be okay?

- 19 Q. Yes, of course?
- A. So it totalled -- I had responsibility for over 80
 officers. We -- 37 of those was used to support the families, and that was all 29 victims that we had

Detective Chief Inspector, it tends to be forgotten that these events can take a toll even on experienced investigating officers. You have needed to liaise with a significant number of extremely distressed individuals and to understand the fine detail of this deeply disturbing event.

This included the need to gain a real understanding of the precise sequence of events by viewing over and over again some truly upsetting CCTV clips. You had to delve, as you have told us this morning, insofar as one is able, into AR's depraved motivation and the horrors that he was researching on the internet.

There is not the slightest suggestion that you did all of that to anything less than the highest professional standards, and you have my thanks on behalf of the public for your highly effective contribution and those of your brother and sister officers to the criminal investigation and to this Inquiry.

So you leave the witness box with my thanks.

- (h) Further witness statements provided to the Inquiry regarding Alice's treatment, comprising: 9 North West Ambulance Service statements; 9 statements of Alder Hey Hospital clinicians; 1 statement from a Southport and Formby District General Hospital clinician; and

10 SIR ADRIAN FULFORD: Yes, Mr Moss.

11 MR MOSS: Thank you, sir.

This is a summary of the most relevant content of the expert medical report of Professor Richard Lyon, Consultant in Emergency Medicine and Pre-hospital Care, regarding the death of Alice da Silva Aguiar and the survivability of her injuries. The full report (PFL000001) has been circulated to the Core Participants. It rightly contains comprehensive clinical information regarding Alice's injuries, the full details of which are distressing for her family. In light of the fact that Professor Lyon's conclusions are not being challenged in this Inquiry by any Core Participant, this summary seeks to put into the public domain the material parts of Professor Lyon's report

without the full clinical details that would be most 42

1 further statement from a Merseyside Police Officer;

(i) A dramatis, timeline, schedule of Rule 9 requests and a summary of Helicopter Emergency Medical Services (HEMS) information provided by the Inquiry.

Professor Lyon sets out a summary of his CV, which in the published version will be annexed to the summary that I'm reading.

Professor Lyon sets out a detailed timeline regarding Alice's treatment from the evidence he has reviewed. Without repeating that entire chronology, the core timings and sequence are as follows:

- (a) The CCTV shows Alice running out of the Hart Space at 11.46.28.
- (b) She ran to the white BMW in the carpark and ended up lying on the far side of the BMW.
- (c) Alice was picked up from near the BMW by Joel Verite and carried towards 34 Hart Street. Professor Lyon considers that Alice appeared unconscious when carried by him. Outside 34 Hart Street, Alice was assisted there by Marcin Tyjon and by Andrew Batchelor who was relaying information on a 999 call.
- (d) The first North West Ambulance Service (NWAS) crew were next to Alice at 11.59.02.
- (e) Still at the scene,
 - (i) Firstly, Cardio Pulmonary Resuscitation was

- started by NWAS clinicians and Alice's airway was secured with an i-gel airway. A Merseyside Police officer assisted by performing CPR under NWAS direction.
- (ii) Secondly, Alice had chest seals applied, intraosseous access was obtained with appropriate medications administered, bilateral needle chest decompressions were performed, and these were upgraded by an advanced paramedic to bilateral thoracostomies.
- (f) The decision made to take Alice by road ambulance to Southport and Formby District General Hospital because this was the nearest Emergency Department.
- (g) The ambulance left with Alice at 12.33. She had a single defibrillator shock administered whilst en route to hospital when her cardiac rhythm had briefly changed from pulseless electrical activity (PEA) to ventricular fibrillation (VF).
- (h) Alice arrived at Southport and Formby District General Hospital at 12.41 and was in the resuscitation room by 12.43.20.
- (i) The decision was made to send a paediatric surgical team from Alder Hey to Southport and Formby District General Hospital who took part in further surgical intervention.
 - (j) Alice was later transferred from Southport
- (e) The lack of heart movement on the ultrasound scan taken at Southport Hospital implied a virtually zero chance of survival.
- (f) The only theoretical possibility where Alice could have survived from her inflicted injuries would have been for her to receive a blood transfusion before she went into cardiac arrest. A blood transfusion would have needed to have been initiated, with a sufficient volume of blood products immediately available on scene to maintain her circulating blood volume, until Alice could undergo emergency thoracic surgery. But given the context of this incident, and the timing and location of Alice's cardiac arrest, and the available emergency medical resources, it would not have been possible for Alice to survive her injuries.
- (g) The immediate lay bystander response that Alice received was commendable but there was nothing that the bystanders could have done to prevent Alice from going into cardiac arrest at the scene.
- (h) Alice received rapid care, with both Merseyside Police and NWAS being on scene within a small number of minutes. Given the complexity of this incident, consideration being needed for responder and scene safety and the multiple patients involved, this response timeframe was commendable. The delay in attending other

hospital to Alder Hey Hospital arriving at 21.20 in the Emergency Department, and after further testing she was admitted to Paediatric Intensive Care.

(k) Alice suffered further cardiac arrest and was pronounced life extinct at 01.20 on 30 July 2024.

In his opinion section, Professor Lyon has provided the following expert opinion:

- (a) Alice sustained critical internal injuries as a result of being stabbed. Alice was bleeding internally into her chest from several different sites. The type of bleeding this caused was slower than arterial bleeding, which is why -- for a short period of time -- Alice was able to run from the scene, before collapsing from critical blood loss. Alice would have quickly collapsed and lost consciousness, and then gone into cardiac arrest. The cardiac arrest most likely occurred when Alice was still at the BMW.
- (b) It would not have been possible to prevent Alice suffering a cardiac arrest at the scene.
- (c) Once Alice had suffered the cardiac arrest, her probability of meaningful survival would have been less than 2 per cent.
- (d) Alice would have suffered irreversible brain injury from lack of oxygen to the brain due to the period for which she was in cardiac arrest.

patients was minimal, a paramedic attending to Alice would not have been able to prevent her deteriorating into traumatic cardiac arrest if she was not already in cardiac arrest.

- (i) While the overall ambulance dispatch and management processes of NWAS would be a matter for an expert in ambulance operational command and management, Professor Lyon considers the NWAS system to have been entirely appropriate.
- (j) Given the nature of this incident, NWAS paramedics should be commended for performing a dynamic risk assessment and attending the scene without any significant delay or holding at a rendezvous point.

 Professor Lyon considers that Alice received rapid medical care from NWAS and that there was minimal, if any, delay in Alice receiving emergency medical care in the context of this type of incident.
- (k) The bystanders correctly attempted to control Alice's external bleeding. The paramedics who attended to Alice correctly followed the standard European Resuscitation Council guidance and provided rapid, high-quality care.
- (I) As regards triaging decisions, the first paramedic on scene performed the correct actions of undertaking a dynamic risk assessment, proceeding to the

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location where patients were present and followed the standard approach to a scene where multiple casualties are present by assessing the entire scene to assess the overall scale of the incident, prior to triaging and treating individual patients. While Mr Tyjon observed that other patients received care prior to Alice, in the context of a major incident, particularly with the complexity that would have been present with multiple stabbed children, where the triage process had not yet been completed for all patients, this short delay was negligible and had no impact on Alice's outcome. A particular challenge of complex and major incidents where multiple patients are triaged as "P1 -- priority 1", is which P1 patients to attend to first until the incident is fully resourced with ambulance responders. The first paramedic to attend to Alice was having to assess her and another patient who was lying next to Alice, who was also critically injured.

- (m) The timeline and sequence of paramedic treatment given to Alice at the scene was entirely appropriate. The pre-hospital care that Alice received was of high quality and was entirely adequate and appropriate.
- (n) If a HEMS team had been present prior to Alice departing for hospital, there would have been consideration given to performing a pre-hospital

incident.

- (q) As to Alice's care at Southport and Formby District General Hospital, there was no delay in recognising Alice's condition, appropriate tests and assessments were carried out and all necessary equipment, medications and products were available to treat Alice.
- Hey was entirely reasonable. Earlier transfer to Alder Hey would not have changed the outcome. Alice was too unstable for transfer prior to undergoing damage control surgery at Southport.
- or delays in Alice's care at Alder Hey Hospital. Professor Lyon agrees with the statement of one of the Alder Hey clinicians that Alice deteriorated despite maximum treatment in the intensive care setting and by then her condition was such that there was no hope of recovery.

remembered that an incident involving multiple children with severe penetrating injuries is a very rare occurrence, likely to be a once-in-a-career event for many of the clinicians involved. The emotional burden of such an event is also extreme. In his opinion, given

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resuscitative thoracotomy. They may have not have conducted that procedure because of the other casualties and the duration of Alice's cardiac arrest and, in Professor Lyon's view, even if conducted at the scene, the procedure would not have changed the outcome because of the nature of Alice's injuries and the duration of her cardiac arrest. Similarly, even if Alice had been provided with blood/blood products by the first HEMS resources on the scene, this would not have changed her outcome.

- (o) Alice received high-quality care during ambulance transfer to Southport Hospital and during her time in the Emergency Department at Southport and Formby District General Hospital. It was entirely appropriate to take Alice to the nearest trauma unit hospital, which was Southport and Formby District General Hospital, by road ambulance, rather than to Alder Hey Hospital in Liverpool. It would not have been appropriate to transfer Alice by air, in an air ambulance helicopter, whilst she was in cardiac arrest. It is not possible to perform high-quality CPR in the back of a helicopter.
- (p) Alice was the first patient to leave the scene. The time from incident start to Alice leaving scene was 46 minutes. This timeframe is acceptable and to be expected in the context of a complex multi-patient

this context, Alice received exemplary care that may not have been possible in other parts of the United Kingdom. Alice had less than 2 per cent chance of survival of her injuries at the scene, with her subsequent assessment in A&E suggesting a 100 per cent mortality rate. Commenting on the view of one treating clinician, who had not considered the pre-hospital or Emergency Department events in detail, as Professor Lyon has done, Professor Lyon's opinion is that earlier damage control surgery would not have changed the outcome and Alice's injuries were non-survivable from the outset.

Sir, Professor Lyon was asked to comment on future lessons. Whilst there are no specific lessons identified by him from Alice's treatment, he has highlighted a few more general areas in terms of preventing future fatalities in similar incidents:

First, gaining situational awareness of a complex scene when multiple 999 calls are received from the public.

Next, use of chest seals and blood control kits by lay responders. The use of lay person bleed control kits could be more widely adopted. The use of chest seals in these kits could also be considered in future. There will always be a challenge in the location of these kits and making enough immediately accessible.

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(r) The decision later to transfer Alice to Alder

(s) Professor Lyon could find no significant issues

Professor Lyon has commented that it should be

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1 Whilst efforts are underway to place such kits in high 2 risk locations for penetrating injuries (for example in 3 pubs and nightclubs), it would be highly unusual to have 4 such a kit located in a building such as the Hart Space. 5 Next, lack of urgency, delay or reluctance to 6 declare a major incident. 7 Next, early tasking of HEMS and consultant-level 8 pre-hospital emergency medicine responders to scene to 9 aid in clinical decision-making and also bring enhanced 10 care, including critical interventions, such as thoracotomy, to scene as early as possible. 11 12 Next, ensuring intra-operability and communication 13 between police and ambulance service and early use of 14 the M/ETHANE reporting system. 15 Ensuring rapid and effective role allocation at 16 scene. 17 Finally, making blood products available early at 18 scene. This would be especially important for incidents 19 occurring in remote or rural locations, necessitating 20 prolonged ambulance transport times to hospital. 21 Professor Lyon concludes his report by paying 22 tribute to the efforts made by bystanders, NWAS crews, 23 and the Southport and Alder Hey hospital teams, in what 24 he describes as their outstanding response to this 25 terrible incident, and for the commendable attempt to 1 (11.50 am) 2

give Alice the best possible chance of survival, despite her catastrophic injuries.

Sir, this summary was prepared by me but has been agreed by all of the directly affected Core Participants and personally by Professor Lyon.

Just by way of reassurance, with 15 16 DCI Pye, given the huge extent of the ground that he needed to cover, it was extremely difficult to work out 18 in advance how long he would be in addressing each of 19 those areas and for future days and future witnesses, we 20 are, on the whole, able to make a better prediction as 21 to how long each witness is going to last so that time isn't wasted.

22 23 MR MOSS: Sir, I think that is right. I'm very grateful. SIR ADRIAN FULFORD: Thank you very much indeed. Then we 24 25 will sit again at tomorrow at 10.00.
