We feel enormous guilt that our daughter was the last child to be collected that day. She had to spend time in two different strangers' houses, waiting for us to be able to locate her amongst the horrifying chaos that was unfolding before us.

We will always be grateful for the kindness that was shown to her by those two families, caring for our daughter when we couldn't get to her in her most vulnerable moments.

Although our daughter did show such bravery in those moments and she was able to communicate her address to the police, as her parents, the pressure to never leave her in that position again creates huge anxiety and pressures for us both.

She experiences what she calls "daymares", vivid flashbacks that can be triggered by something as ordinary as a crowd of children entering a doorway too

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independence?

We worry for our son too, [...redacted...] -- he had to watch his parents fall apart. He's witnessed the toll this has taken on our family and has no doubt been affected by the changes in us, in our emotional capacity, in our vigilance and in how we parent.

We feel, deeply, that our ability to shield our children from the horrors of the world has been taken from us. The illusion that we could keep them safe, something that all parents need to believe in, was shattered.

Our family has changed forever. We celebrate small joys of course, and we are profoundly grateful that our daughter came home that day. But we also grieve the life that might have been and the security we thought we had. We are incredibly proud of our daughter, of her bravery and the courage it takes on a daily basis to live life and enjoy positive moments. We are proud of all the girls. And we stand with all the families, inspired by their dignity and strength that they have shown through such dark and difficult times.

This Inquiry is our chance to make sure our voices are heard. We hope this process will shine a light into the darkest corners of the systems that failed.

But we are not here out of bitterness, but out of

Our daughter now knows, in a way that no child ever should, that people can be dangerous, that violence can reach into your life with no warning.

Holiday clubs are no longer an option. Birthday parties come with anxiety. This summer something that should bring joy instead brought dread. Bad things happen in the holidays, she says. And as her parents, we struggle with the answer. We try to reassure her. We tell her she is safe. But she looks us in the eye and says, "But something bad did happen", and we can't argue with that.

The effects don't stop with her.

As her parents, we have both had time off work. We are each receiving mental health support. We look over our shoulders when we are out with our children. We plan for what we would do in the event of another trauma. We've even considered leaving the country, uprooting our lives entirely, just to raise our children somewhere that feels safer than here.

We worry constantly about the future. What will this mean for our daughter's teenage years? Her adult life? What will this mean for her friendships, her ability to trust, her future relationships? Will this trauma follow her into the workplace or into moments that should be joyful -- travel, motherhood,

hope -- hope that this process will expose the failures that led to this, acknowledge their consequences, and most importantly, lead to change. What happened was not inevitable. It was preventable.

We ask you to listen not just with legal minds but with human hearts.

We need to know that this Inquiry will matter. That it will lead somewhere. That our daughter's pain and ours will count for something.

Thank you for hearing our voice.

21 THE WITNESS: On 29 July, the height of summer, we woke up 22 deciding between a quiet day in the garden or going to 23 the Taylor Swift day.

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Our two daughters wanted to go. They were so excited. That's how they always were: eager, full of

life and ready for anything.

We had no idea that by the end of that day our lives would never be the same again.

Our eldest was [...redacted...] at the time.

A talented dancer and a huge Taylor Swift fan. She had been looking forward to this day for weeks.

Our youngest was [redacted], an avid footballer, dancing isn't her thing but being a massive Taylor Swift fan, she was lured in by the bracelet making, yoga and spending the day with her big sister, so off they went.

I was at home when I received a panicked phone call from my friend, whose daughter was also at the event, telling me what had happened, she didn't know whether my daughters had survived. I rang my partner, their dad, straight away. He was heading there to collect them.

He drove as fast as he could to the scene, running straight into the building, which was when the reality of how bad things were truly hit him. No one could tell him where our daughters were.

Outside, he was directed to the house they had fled to. Inside he found our youngest, deeply traumatised, with no idea where her sister was.

Running back into the street, he couldn't see her anywhere, before spotting two little legs sticking out from behind a white van. Our eldest lying on the floor,

When her injuries were discovered, she was rushed to be with us. The feeling of guilt of leaving her there, not knowing, will never leave me.

At Alder Hey we were told to speak to our eldest before she was rushed into surgery, to tell her we love her and to prepare ourselves. Those moments will never leave us. The team worked frantically to save her and to repair the damage that had been done.

Watching her be wheeled away, so pale and so small under those bright hospital lights was the most powerless I have ever felt as a mother.

Our youngest went into surgery the following day. Facing it with a smile, not because she wasn't hurting but because she could see that we were. She was trying to protect us all. Seeing her smile made me incredibly proud and broke my heart at the same time.

We later learned that our daughters witnessed the full extent of the horrors that occurred. Their youth and innocence shone through in their initial accounts, with our youngest telling us that her first thought when he entered the room was that he was bringing Leanne's puppy to see them.

Our eldest explained that he had attacked others, then Leanne, before turning on her. He stabbed her in her chest and then as she tried to defend herself, her a stranger applying pressure to her wounds, unbelievably brave in that moment, she told her daddy that she was okav.

It was in that moment, seeing our daughter so gravely injured, covered in blood and barely breathing, that the weight of it overwhelmed him. It was too much for his body to process and he fainted.

It is something that has stayed with him ever since, the image of her lying in the street, the knowledge that he couldn't protect her from what had happened and the feeling of complete and utter powerlessness as a father.

I had to drive for 20 minutes not knowing if my daughters were alive. When I reached Hart Street, the fear hit me like a wall

When I found them, our youngest kept reassuring me that she was okay. She never told us she was injured.

In that moment, as a frightened [...redacted...] who had just been attacked, she put our needs above her own. She stayed silent about her own pain because she could see how badly her sister had been hurt.

Due to the extent of our eldest's injuries, we made the decision to leave our youngest with her grandad. Looking back, it breaks me to know she sat there, bleeding, not asking for help, simply because she didn't want to take anyone's attention away from her sister.

arm.

He then stood over her younger sister with the knife raised. Our eldest tells us that her younger sister wasn't standing or sitting, she says, "Mum, she was crouched, she couldn't move, her face was pure fear". Our eldest, just a child herself and already injured, dragged her sister in front of her to protect her.

She was then stabbed another six times in the back. She says she felt like she was being repeatedly punched from the force.

They scrambled to escape, our eldest bleeding heavily. In the chaos they become separated. Our eldest recalls being pushed through the landing by Heidi and running down the stairs into the carpark.

CCTV would later show her outside, alone and barely able to walk, holding onto to a van for support. You can see that she is trying so hard to keep going but she can't and she falls to the floor and lies alone until a neighbour ran out to help her.

In the scramble to get out, our youngest had become stuck with two other little girls on the landing, there were no adults with them at this time. On the landing, one of the little girls grabbed her hand and put it on the railing, she told her to run and that's when she was stabbed in the back.

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She was able to run down the stairs and she escaped. They called her the "little girl who entered the house last". That was our youngest, she saved herself, guided by another child's hand and protected by her big sister's bravery. I thank God for each of them each and every day. Both of our daughters showed a level of bravery that no child should ever need to show. Our eldest saved her sister's life that day. Despite her own injuries, she put herself in harm's way to protect her little sister. And when she woke up in 12 hospital, her first words were, "Is she okay?" 13 The bond between them is unbreakable.

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They both now live with trauma that no child should carry. Whilst we were incredibly proud of the bravery and determination they have shown every single day, beneath the surface they are not the same as they once were.

Our youngest is terrified of sudden noises. She freezes when she can't process what's happening. She has nightmares, seeing him standing at the end of her

Our eldest cries in private, asking why she lived when others didn't. She carries scars all over her body, a constant reminder of what has happened. She has

My eldest son, who was [redacted] at the same time, asks questions I cannot answer, "Mum, how can someone [...redacted...] do that, especially to little girls, to my sisters?" He doesn't talk about it often but I can see the way it has hardened him and made him wary of the world

For me, I live in a constant state of alertness, scanning for risks, unable to relax when they are out of my sight. The images and sounds from that day and the days that followed haunt me. I continue to take medication both during the day and to help me sleep.

Their dad struggles, haunted by what he saw in the building, of finding our daughter lying on the ground, gravely injured.

We have changed as parents and we know they pick up on this. They see us cautious to drop them at a dance class, checking the doors are locked behind them, they see that we never leave them at football training. They are only ever left with family and they see us continuously messaging to check that they are okay. I worry that this will have a domino effect on the way they parent when their time comes.

We worry for the future, our daughters currently know very little about the events of that day and about him. It felt right to do it this way, they have already

had panic attacks which have been so severe enough to make her pass out.

Neither of them are able to sleep alone, each needing a parent to be with them to feel safe. Our eldest sleeps with me, and our youngest with her dad.

They cannot shower alone and never sit with their backs to doors, they must always sit with the door in view, and they tell us this is because if something happens they can make a run for the door. They both continue to receive professional psychological support.

We have had to arrange for private physiotherapy for our eldest as the thought of attending appointments at the hospital brings back the memories of why she was there. There is a [...redacted...] and it weighs heavily on her and us.

Our once carefree children now live with a fear far beyond their years. They struggle to trust and question everything.

They carry the trauma and we carry it with them.

The ongoing effect it has had not just on us but our close family is hard, it's affected us all, it is something we and they think about all the time. It's reached into every corner of our family and left none of us the same. My dad was with us at the scene and he continues to struggle with what he witnessed.

had so much to deal with and little minds should not have to process any of this. They have asked innocent questions such as his name and his age, with our youngest asking, "Are his mummy and dad really mad for what he's done".

But eventually they will ask and they will be able to search for information themselves and I have no doubt it will be devastating to them if they could read this could have been prevented. We will have no option but to guide them through this, that is why the Inquiry matters. It must find out all the answers to the questions and bring about change, so that, at the very least, we can assure the girls that change did come.

We will continue to guide our beautiful girls as best we can, we know that this will never leave them. But we will do everything in our power to make sure it doesn't define them.

Their end of year school reports this year were outstanding and caused tears for all the right reasons. To see their resilience, determination and the way they continued to try so hard at school, despite everything, was overwhelming. A reminder that their spirit and character continues to shine through, even in the darkest of circumstances.

Our eldest has always had a huge heart and has been

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focused on helping others from a very young age.

I really thought that this tragedy might take some of her thoughtfulness away because she has had so much to cope with. But it hasn't. It has made her even more determined to give back and help others because she knows the community helped her and her sister. She has formalised her charity events and raised huge sums over the last 12 months, which have already helped so many people. She is determined to continue to grow this. We are so proud of her and we cannot wait to support her on her journey.

To our girls, we are proud beyond words of both of you and we want you to know that you are our heroes and the courage that you showed that day, and every day since, is beyond belief.

Searching for her amongst the blood and the chaos, screaming her name, not knowing where my baby was or what had happened to her is a feeling that no parent should ever have to feel.

I will forever be traumatised by the sight of [...redacted...] covered in blood. The fear on her face, the idea that somebody could so heartlessly walk into an experience which should have been so full of innocence, joy and laughter and take away her childhood is a thought I find impossible to bear.

Because this violent act has taken away our daughter's childhood. She has had to grow up far too fast.

In a time when she should be carefree and innocent, she has had to learn to be fearful.

More than a year on, the trauma still holds her tightly. She spends her young life scanning her surroundings for danger, checking behind her, ensuring she is safe, looking for adults she knows she can trust.

She cannot sleep in her own bed. Each night she lies awake, haunted by flashbacks and nightmares, unable to close her eyes unless a loved one is close. My husband, displaced by necessity, sleeps on the sofa so that she can feel the safety she so desperately needs.

Even within the supposed safety of our own home, she

I have always, since she was born, called my daughter our "Sunshine".

Her sunny, vivacious, carefree and joyful personality is infectious. She brings happiness, silliness and sassiness to every situation and instantly cheers up everyone she meets.

Since 29 July 2024, she has struggled so much to find that sunshine.

She now lives in constant fear, forever checking over her shoulder for danger.

She struggles with finding enthusiasm for tasks she once loved.

She has wild mood swings and fits of tears and worry.

While she will always be our little Sunshine, we now spend every day chasing away the storm clouds and sheltering her from the rain.

The image of the devastation on Hart Space when I turned the corner to collect our daughter from her dance class, will never leave my mind as long as I live.

still struggles; she rarely now plays in her bedroom alone, an activity she loved previously. She's still too afraid to go up and or down stairs or going to the toilet alone.

A keen gymnast, she now struggles with many movements, holding herself back in the fear that the action will hurt the site of her injuries.

In so many ways, the attack forced her to immediately grow up that day.

One of the last girls to escape the building alive, and with no adults in the building able to assist her, she had to advocate for herself and find her own way out. She tells us vividly how she chose to wait and allow others out first because she had already been attacked and she didn't want them to be. She told them to run and not scream, advice she had been told when there had been a gas leak at her school.

Clustered at the top of the stairs, she was attacked again. She ran from the building so terrified that she ran straight into the road, almost being struck by a car in the process, the fear so great that other dangers couldn't be comprehended.

Even when sheltered in a house, bleeding profusely from the five stab wounds to her back and arm, she was seen checking on others, comforting them, making sure

they were okay.

We are so proud of how kind and caring our girl is, her finest qualities shone through in the darkest of moments

There are so many of these stories of heroism from all of the girls that day. Stories which show just what warriors they were to face such extreme adversity alone, with only each other to help them through.

It is our solemn promise to our girl that these are the stories that will be remembered. The stories of how kind, strong and incredibly brave she was, how she helped save others and tried to bring comfort, even when she was suffering herself.

Knowing she will grow up with physical scars marring her tiny body is devastating. A constant reminder of how close we came to losing her that day, so much of her tiny frame is covered in raised, angry scars.

She once joked that they were shark bites but now she only cries that they hurt and inch. She seeks out baggy clothes to hide them. I worry for the teenage days when she wants to wear bikinis or prom dresses, and how difficult that choice might be for her.

The physical scars are a battle she will face every day but knowing that she will grow up with mental scars affecting her every choice and action, making her feel

Flashbacks at being told she had been stabbed and the feeling of complete futility, in being stranded hundreds of miles away. They would frantically call back every few minutes for an update, whilst trying to get a flight as soon as possible. They arrived home just in time for her surgery and only then understood the true horror of her injuries.

One of the greatest impacts for my husband was that our daughter was always a "daddy's girl". They enjoyed a special bond and she would seek comfort in his presence. However, for some time after the attack, she frequently gravitated more towards me, seemingly distrusting men. This change was devastating. The shattering of a sacred bond and the cruellest of

For my daughter, the one thing that gives her reassurance is the idea that the person that hurt her is behind bars and cannot commit this act again to anyone else. It is an assurance she requires often to help her sleep, to help her want to attend school, to help her get through life. I hope that one day this assurance will allow her to feel childlike again, to experience the innocence and joy, and bring back the incredible, sassy, vivacious nature of her personality, which has been so diluted by this horrendous experience.

fear at every step, is so much worse.

For the past year, so many of our family's fun plans have become a blur of hospitals, fear and worry. It has caused incredible stress, emotion and a strain on our relationships as we process the trauma.

Our daughter has gone from a happy, bubbly girl, sassy, funny and incredibly independent for her age, to someone afraid, meek and withdrawn. Our greatest concern is that, on that day, her attacker took a little bit of her innocence and tenacity and she may never get that back.

My son too has suffered immensely with nightmares, anxiety and fear. Despite his young age, he has taken on a role as a third parent, constantly worried about his sister's welfare and whereabouts. He too has lost such a big part of the innocence and wonder of being a child.

My husband and son were abroad at the same time of the attack and they both suffer flashbacks of receiving my frantic call, screaming that I couldn't find our daughter. They had to stand helplessly, listening as I described the scene in front of me, as I shouted our daughter's name, hearing the anguish and fear in my voice, before the sudden relief of hearing our daughter shout "Mummy" as I reached her.

In turn, I hope this Inquiry brings her the assurance that this kind of devastating attack will not happen again to more little girls like her, and that she and her peers are safe from harm when enjoying simple childhood pleasures dancing and playing with her friends

Whilst this attack has had a devastating impact on our tiny girl, we, and she, will not let it define her.

She is becoming stronger each and every day, physically and mentally and she now spends much of her time actively fighting to improve the world around her.

She has been making bracelets non-stop, to fund raise for the amazing charities connected to the attack, such a show of strength and determination, especially when you consider that this is what the girls were doing when they were attacked.

She wants to write and illustrate stories to help other children to be brave in the face of adversity. She never stops caring for others. Even she was attacked, she asked, "What happened to him to make so angry?" and "Did people not love him?" We will never cease to be amazed by her empathy and kindness and know that this will be the route to healing for her.

We are forever grateful that our girl, our Sunshine, survived that day, and that is what has carried us

The hardest thing, as her parents, has been hearing her describe what she witnessed in excruciating detail.

She remembers everything.

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She told us how, when he entered the room with his hood up, she thought it must be a surprise to end the workshop. She intuitively started to move towards him, until she realised the girl he had been holding was bleeding.

And that is when she ran.

Since that day, we as a family have endured more heartache and suffering than most will go through in a lifetime. She may not have been harmed physically but she witnessed and remembers everything about that day and we watched our vibrant, joyful little girl become fearful of her own shadow.

She has endured terrifying nightmares, crippling anxiety and immense fear at any unknown sound or knock at the door. She continues to suffer from panic attacks and needs ongoing professional psychological support. Her dad continues to sleep in her room to provide her comfort and reassurance.

There are no words that can truly capture the fear, trauma and devastation our daughter experienced that

An act of pure evil that lasted minutes but has ruined a lifetime of childhood innocence, trust in society and happy memories.

She has since told us that something deep down had told her not to go that day and she continues to say

Dance, the thing she loved most, became somewhere to fear.

She did eventually return but, for a long time, she couldn't be left alone at class and we had to sit outside every session so she knew what that she was

Now she can only participate because she knows the doors are locked and can only be controlled by the teachers inside the room.

The word "workshop" has become a significant trigger for her and this affects her ability to take part in activities she used to enjoy, especially during the school holidays.

Our daughter has always been sociable and active, she is the kind of child who has always wanted to try any activity and live her life fully.

From the outside, she still looks like this to many people but what they don't see is the endless support and preparation she requires at home to achieve this.

She now requires constant reassurance to feel safe.

Every day begins with us talking through what is going to happen, what she can expect and who will be there. We try to prepare her for every eventuality the day could bring because we know that any disruption in her routine brings panic.

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She requires a level of helicopter parenting we 1 2 never wanted but have been forced to adopt. 3 Returning to her annual dance show was a significant 4 milestone that came with new challenges. 5 Her participation was only made possible through 6 extra support from us, from her dance school, her 7 teachers, her friends and arrangements for 8 a professional security firm to be on site. 9 During dress rehearsals, her dad stood at the door 10 to help her and others feel safe enough to perform. 11 And she did. She got back up on that stage and we 12 couldn't have been prouder of her. 13 But the anxiety still remains. 14 Every event continues to require a careful level of 15 planning and emotional preparation. She shows 16 an extraordinary level of determination and bravery 17 every time she attends an activity that she once looked 18 forward to without hesitation. 19 She has returned to school, thankfully she sees it 20 as a safe place and for that we are grateful, but even 21 where we can see the impact. Her emotions are 22 constantly heightened and little comments now affect her 23 deeply. 24 She catastrophises situations that other children 25 would shrug off. 29 1 As parents, we now live with the crushing weight of 2 pretending to be strong. Putting on fake smiles for the 3 sake of all those around us, all while battling deep 4 anxiety and fear, terrified to ever let our little girl 5 out of our sight again. 6 I will live that day forever. 7 [...Redacted...] when I heard my husband's screams 8 down the phone, telling me that someone was attacking 9 the girls and he couldn't get to them. Our daughter and 10 her two friends. I felt my world collapse around me. 11 Driving there, police and ambulances were 12 everywhere, overtaking me on the way and I didn't know 13 if my daughter was alive. 14 Calling my friend to tell her what was happening to 15 our daughters will stay with me forever, and hearing her 16 scream "Get my babies!" 17 My husband called me when he found our daughter, she 18 was with one of our friends' daughters who had been 19 stabbed, they were safe in a house but the other one was 20 still missing and the panic remained. 21 Our daughter must have been terrified. She is not 22 a child who screams or cries when scared. She retreats 23 into herself and she freezes but that day she was

1 We find she holds it together at school but, when 2 she comes home, she unloads all her emotions and we have 3 to rebuild her. 4 Despite everything, she continues to astound us. 5 She fights every day to participate in life in ways that 6 come easily to other children, in ways that used to come 7 easily to her. 8 We are forever in awe of who she is and what she 9 achieves every day. 10 This Inquiry must bring about real change. It must 11 lead to reform, accountability and answers. > I was still driving home when I saw her run into our house on our video doorbell, screaming hysterically and telling her dad to lock the doors.

She went straight to her room and text me saying that, "Mummy, I'm scared".

It was the first moment I believed that she was physically okay but I could see, even on the camera, that a part of her was broken in a way that could never fully be repaired.

The days that followed were a blur of trauma and fear and we bear the scars of what we saw both that day and in the days afterwards. We were trying to protect our daughter while the world around us erupted in a way that we could never have imagined.

The constant news reports.

The riots and the constant sirens.

Mixed in with the worry of those we loved who were horrifically injured.

My husband has never spoken about that day since giving his statement to the police. He simply cannot.

The trauma of what he saw, the terror he felt for our daughter and our friends has silenced him.

His world has always revolved around our daughter but now his fatherly instincts have become all-consuming. He still sleeps in her room, her
