SIR ADRAIN FULFORD: On 29 July 2024, there was an attack in Southport of unparalleled cruelty. Nothing matching the extreme and very particular depravity of this event has previously occurred in the United Kingdom, certainly in modern times. A teenager, to whom I shall refer as AR, then aged 17, perpetrated a chilling and carefully planned assault armed with a large knife that he had recently bought online via Amazon. He travelled by taxi to a Taylor Swift-themed dance and yoga event, where he killed and inflicted devastating injuries on as many children as he was able. He did not hesitate, in the process, to assault and gravely injure two adults who were in his path. AR had earlier selected this particular venue as his target and I am confident, based on the advertising for this event on social media, that he was fully aware that those attending would be very young girls, along with the two female organisers.

It is fundamental in considering why AR acted in this inhuman way to understand that he was not suffering from any kind of mental illness. What occurred in this case, therefore, cannot be explained on the basis that his violence was a regrettable symptom or consequence of a serious mental disorder, such as psychosis. A variety of professionals considered AR's mental state prior to

1

intending to kill or to cause others really serious harm. His parents and multiple officials from a wide range of relevant organisations knew this, albeit at differing levels of detail. Rigorously putting out of mind the so-called "benefits of hindsight", I have no doubt that if appropriate procedures had been in place, and if sensible steps had been taken by the agencies and AR's parents, this dreadful event would not have happened. It could have been and it should have been prevented.

Over a long period of time, AR had become an aggressive, near-total recluse, who bullied and threatened his family and unashamedly lied to officials. As a teenager, he had researched websites selling a wide range of knives, crossbows, bows and arrows, machetes, sledgehammers, and the items needed for making multiple Molotov cocktails. He had asked his father to buy him petrol and he had purchased a sizeable petrol can. A number of weapons or other potentially lethal items of this kind had been purchased by him online and delivered to the family's home address. Indeed, he had bought, again online, the ingredients necessary for manufacturing the highly lethal poison, ricin, and he had experimented with making a crude preparation of this exceptionally dangerous substance. To add to this truly

and following his despicable actions on 29 July and no relevant psychiatric diagnosis has ever been advanced.

What we know instead is that from his early teens he had become ever more fixated on extreme violence. I have no doubt at all that this disturbing preoccupation had been fed during the many years when, wholly unsupervised and lacking any parental controls, he spent the majority of his waking hours online. The strong indications are that he fuelled his perversely violent fixation by viewing a wide range of deeply inappropriate and disturbing subjects that are all too available on the internet. It is no coincidence that one of the last things he did before he left his family's home to commit these cruel offences was to locate a graphic and simply appalling video on X (formerly known as Twitter) of a knife attack on Bishop Emmanuel in Australia. This was, beyond doubt, in my view, to strengthen his resolve to carry through with his cowardly and murderous plan.

Furthermore, this attack was perpetrated by a young person who it was known was potentially highly dangerous. He had carried a knife, including most particularly to school, on multiple previous occasions and he had unemotionally and repeatedly admitted, long before the events of 29 July, that he had done so

worrying background, it should be remembered that for over two years before the attack on 29 July, AR had only ever left home by himself when he was intending to kill or seriously harm others.

I cannot stress too strongly, therefore, that what happened on that terrible day was not, to use the familiar phrase, "a bolt of lightning out of a clear blue sky". Instead, some form of grave violence by AR had been clearly, repeatedly and unambiguously signposted over many years. Indeed, several professionals who had direct contact with him expressed serious fears, sometimes in stark terms, that he would go on to harm or kill. Those fears were communicated and yet they did not result in the co-ordinated and effective action that was needed.

One of the most striking conclusions from this Inquiry's extensive investigation is the sheer number of the missed opportunities over many years to intervene meaningfully, which directly contributed to the failure to avert this disaster. Numerous systems that should have provided oversight, assessment and protection were ineffective or inadequately used. Some failed outright. The consequences, as it does not need for me to say, were catastrophic.

It is unrealistic to suppose that all violent

1 individuals can be prevented from carrying out attacks
2 on others. But when a truly grave risk has been clearly
3 identified, our society is entitled to expect, at the
4 very least, that meaningful and substantive steps will
5 be taken to avert the impending disaster. That
6 conspicuously did not happen in this case.

7 I have made a significant number of criticisms in
8 this Report of various agencies, along with some of the
9 individuals working within them, which in turn have
10 resulted in a substantial list of Recommendations as to
11 future action in the hope of averting attacks of this
12 kind in the future. These criticisms have not been made
13 lightly. The organisations and individuals concerned
14 have had an opportunity of considering and responding to
15 them before the final conclusions were reached.

16 I urge the media and online commentators not to
17 latch on to individual sentences or isolated conclusions
18 from the report, particularly if they are lifted out of
19 their true context, in order to vilify or unfairly
20 attack any of the individuals or the bodies for whom
21 they work. With very few exceptions, I watched a large
22 number of public servants give evidence who had
23 diligently applied themselves to their work, often
24 fulfilling high-pressured but under-resourced roles, and
25 who acted at the time in what they considered to be in

1 deter any one of them from undertaking a meaningful risk
2 assessment, followed by the effective co-ordination of a
3 proper response. There was a widespread but false
4 assumption that this duty rested with some other
5 organisation when, in fact, no-one was discharging this
6 role. AR consequently "fell through the cracks" as one
7 witness presciently expressed her fears prior to the
8 attack. This was a fundamental mistake which
9 contributed to the dire consequences in this case. Such
10 a failure must not be allowed to happen again. Agencies
11 must not simply pass on the risk to others or assume
12 others have taken on responsibility, with the result
13 that there is in fact a total absence of a sustainable
14 plan led by an identified organisation which, in turn,
15 has nominated a particular individual with
16 responsibility for co-ordinating the response to the
17 identified threat.

18 Second, there were notable and wholly avoidable
19 examples of poor information management and information
20 sharing, within and between the relevant agencies. One
21 alarming feature of this was that critical information
22 was often diluted over time with the result that the
23 true risk posed by AR was insufficiently understood.
24 This breakdown in the proper handling of information had
25 significant consequences as regards the failure by the

1 the best interests of our society.

2 I urge the same approach in relation to AR's
3 parents, about whom I have expressed a number of
4 profound concerns. Notwithstanding their failures, AR
5 placed his mother and father in an extremely difficult
6 position, creating a domestic environment that was
7 highly challenging. Their life at home must have become
8 little short of a nightmare given, to use the words of
9 his own father, AR had turned into a "monster".

10 I have tried to ensure that the criticisms I have
11 made are balanced and I trust that the media and social
12 media coverage of this report will be fair and that it
13 will reasonably reflect the conclusions that I have
14 reached.

15 This is, of necessity, a long report. There is an
16 early summary of the most notable overarching failures
17 in the Chapter entitled "Fundamental problems". For the
18 purposes of this short introduction, I simply indicate
19 that there were five principal failures that are central
20 to understanding what occurred.

21 First, no organisation or any of the multi-agency
22 arrangements sufficiently accepted or enabled ownership
23 of, or overall responsibility for, the risk posed by AR.
24 Indeed, the laudable objective of involving multiple
25 agencies operated -- with only limited exceptions -- to

1 agencies to take appropriate steps to intervene to
2 prevent the attack on 29 July.

3 Third, AR's deeply problematic behaviour was too
4 frequently excused on the basis of his perceived or
5 later diagnosed autism spectrum disorder. Autism is not
6 a mental illness. It is instead a neurodevelopmental
7 condition, and I want to stress that it would be
8 entirely wrong to make a general association between
9 autism and an increased risk of the individual concerned
10 becoming violent. Nevertheless, AR fell into a cohort
11 of those with autism whose individual characteristics
12 mean that this condition carries an increased risk of
13 harm to others. Agencies regularly simply used autism
14 as an explanation, or even an excuse, for his conduct,
15 including his violence. Strategies and interventions
16 were needed in order to address the risk he posed and
17 the causes of it, but instead, as a result of this
18 significant lack of understanding, the problem was left
19 both unmanaged and underestimated.

20 Fourth, there was a wholesale failure to oversee
21 and intervene in AR's deeply inappropriate online
22 activities. The lack of exploration of, or engagement
23 with, AR's online life was a significant failing that
24 hampered agencies in identifying and addressing the risk
25 AR posed. How someone is behaving online is, in my

1 view, an effective potential predictor as to how they
 2 will behave offline, yet this route to understanding
 3 what was going on was entirely ignored. Notwithstanding
 4 AR's attempts to view violent imagery online at school,
 5 no curiosity was shown as regards the material he was
 6 researching at home during the months and years in which
 7 his behaviour increasingly deteriorated. Overall, only
 8 glancing interest was ever shown in AR's internet life,
 9 and when limited questions were asked, AR's false and
 10 self-serving replies were far too readily accepted.

11 Fifth and finally, although I have already
 12 referred to the difficulties they undoubtedly faced,
 13 AR's parents bear considerable blame for what occurred.
 14 All too frequently, they created significant obstacles
 15 to constructive engagement by AR with the various
 16 relevant agencies; they were too ready to excuse and
 17 defend the multiple examples of his wholly inappropriate
 18 actions and the lies which he told; they failed to stand
 19 up to his behaviour and to set boundaries; they
 20 neglected to investigate and prohibit AR's purchase of
 21 weapons which were arriving at the family home through
 22 the post; and they failed to report the dramatic
 23 escalation in the evident risk he posed in the period
 24 between 22 and 29 July, including perhaps most notably
 25 on the day of the attack itself.

1 occasion. There was a failure to strike the right
 2 balance between handling the clear risk AR posed to
 3 others and the need to avoid criminalising children.

4 Furthermore, AR was found carrying a knife on a
 5 bus in March 2022. He was not arrested and the incident
 6 was, in essence, treated as a safeguarding issue. AR
 7 should instead have been arrested by the officers who
 8 attended at the scene. In fairness to them, I stress
 9 that they were young officers, operating within a
 10 policing culture that regarded custody as a last resort
 11 for children and -- importantly -- through no fault on
 12 their part, they did not have the full picture regarding
 13 AR's risk.

14 In addition to carrying a knife, however, AR,
 15 without prompting, smilingly referred to poisoning
 16 others in the future and to having tried to manufacture
 17 poison in the past. Given he had said he wanted to stab
 18 someone with the knife he was carrying, this revelation
 19 concerning poisons should, without more, have led to his
 20 arrest. His home would then have been searched and the
 21 items which would inevitably have been found would have
 22 led to criminal charges and a potential custodial
 23 sentence. As a consequence, the attack on 29 July would
 24 most probably not have occurred, albeit it is important
 25 that I stress that there were other missed opportunities

1 Against that background, I want to provide, in the
 2 shortest terms, my conclusions in relation to the
 3 central themes that have arisen during the course of the
 4 Inquiry's hearings. I have already touched on some of
 5 the issues relating to the attack, the accumulation of
 6 weapons and the poison, the online harm that was caused
 7 to AR and role of his family, but it is equally
 8 important to focus on the part played by the police,
 9 including Counter-Terrorism Police, the Prevent
 10 Programme, social care and healthcare, and AR's
 11 education. Whilst I stress the importance of the full
 12 description that is given in the relevant chapters of
 13 the report, my overall conclusions for each of these
 14 areas can be fairly summarised in what now very briefly
 15 follows.

16 I have analysed the response by the police to
 17 seven principal incidents involving AR. I am
 18 particularly concerned that a decision was reached not
 19 to arrest him in October 2019, despite the fact that he
 20 had taken a knife into school on at least ten occasions,
 21 intending potentially to use it to kill or inflict
 22 really serious harm on another pupil. Although the
 23 officers acted with the best intentions, the possible
 24 need for a criminal investigation -- whether by arrest
 25 or otherwise -- was insufficiently considered on that

1 further down the line.

2 As to Prevent, AR was referred to Prevent on three
 3 occasions by The Acorns School: in December 2019 and
 4 February and April 2021. In relation to the first
 5 referral, the Prevent officers should have checked, most
 6 particularly with AR's school, as to whether his
 7 explanations for his behaviour were reliable. Input
 8 from clinicians should have been sought regarding AR's
 9 autism. There was a failure by the school to provide,
 10 and counter-terrorism police officers to obtain, AR's
 11 internet browsing history whilst at school. This would
 12 have revealed that AR had been researching school
 13 shootings and searching online for images of the
 14 infliction of deeply unpleasant injuries. If these
 15 steps had been taken, AR's first referral would have
 16 been adopted by Prevent.

17 Notwithstanding these mistakes, I accept that the
 18 Prevent officers acted with diligence and they were
 19 hampered by an unhelpful lack of clarity as to whether
 20 Prevent should take on someone in AR's circumstances,
 21 namely an individual demonstrating signs of being
 22 fixated on violence but without an adherence to a
 23 particular ideology. This uncertainty was a significant
 24 factor, in my judgment. Nonetheless, rejecting AR for
 25 further action under the Prevent Programme in response

1 to the first referral was simply the wrong decision.
 2 Although the circumstances giving rise to the
 3 second and third Prevent referrals were in themselves
 4 less serious, they ought to have prompted a
 5 re-assessment of the risk posed by AR. There were, in
 6 addition to these failures, three further missed
 7 opportunities for agencies to make additional Prevent
 8 referrals.

9 Notwithstanding these various conclusions on the
 10 relevant evidence, I have been unable to determine with
 11 any degree of certainty as to what the outcome would
 12 have been if AR had in fact been adopted by the Prevent
 13 Programme.

14 Turning to social care, Lancashire County
 15 Council's employees clearly acted in what they
 16 considered to be the public interest, fulfilling
 17 difficult roles in challenging circumstances. There
 18 was, nonetheless, a notable lack of appreciation by the
 19 local authority of the need to manage the risk which AR
 20 posed to others. Indeed, the enduring focus of those
 21 involved with AR was on the risks to him rather than the
 22 need to protect the public from him. One of the key
 23 lessons from this terrible attack is that the present
 24 child protection system is imperfectly designed to cope
 25 with children and young people when it is apprehended

1 this step was quintessentially necessary in AR's case.
 2 Linked to this significant omission was the troubling
 3 dilution, over time, of the information which revealed
 4 the extent of AR's risk to others, information which was
 5 held by those involved in his healthcare. As a
 6 consequence of this, important material from 2019 and
 7 early 2020 which amply demonstrated the appreciable risk
 8 of significant violence by AR was not later taken into
 9 account by clinicians working with him. This failure to
 10 appreciate the risk he posed could have been avoided
 11 either if the information systems had been better
 12 designed or if the checks by the clinicians of the
 13 detailed records had been more diligent.

14 AR's autism diagnosis was also unduly delayed,
 15 although I stress this was not a pre-condition for
 16 performing a comprehensive risk assessment. Although
 17 I accept that treatments were appropriately offered to
 18 AR, and that the community mental health services were
 19 diligent and persistent in trying to engage with him
 20 nonetheless, with certain limited exceptions, the
 21 overall assessment and management of the risk posed by
 22 AR on the part of the healthcare agencies was
 23 inadequate.

24 Turning finally to education, AR's mainstream
 25 secondary school, the Range High School, made an

1 there is a real risk that they may inflict serious harm
 2 on others. A consequence of this critically blinkered
 3 approach was that on a number of occasions AR's case was
 4 closed by social care when that should not have
 5 happened, and equally there were times when his case was
 6 not escalated to a higher level when this step was
 7 necessary. In both situations AR's dangerousness was
 8 given insufficient consideration. In a similar vein,
 9 even making all due allowance for the impacts of
 10 Covid-19, there was a poor standard of management of AR
 11 under the Court-imposed referral order in 2020: in
 12 particular, insufficient steps were taken to identify
 13 and tackle the causes of his offending. Finally, as a
 14 cross-cutting issue with the local authority, there were
 15 significant examples of poor record-keeping and
 16 inadequate information sharing.

17 In relation to healthcare, there was a significant
 18 failure to identify a lead agency which had principal
 19 responsibility for AR. Additionally, there should have
 20 been a comprehensive, medically informed and structured
 21 risk assessment of him based on the material information
 22 held by all the relevant agencies. I accept that such
 23 assessments are significant undertakings which need to
 24 be justified. But I have no doubt, once again putting
 25 entirely out of mind the benefits of hindsight, that

1 unassailably correct decision permanently to exclude him
 2 when he repeatedly carried a knife to school in October
 3 2019, intending, as he admitted, to use it to kill or to
 4 cause serious harm. AR had not been the victim of
 5 systematic bullying, despite his claims to the contrary,
 6 claims which form part of his attempted justification
 7 for his actions. The Acorns School -- the Pupil
 8 Referral Unit to which he was sent -- deserves
 9 significant praise for its assessment of the risks that
 10 AR posed to others. It responsibly, proactively and
 11 persistently sought to ensure that these well-founded
 12 fears were shared with the other relevant agencies and
 13 that they were properly addressed. By way of contrast,
 14 there was a significant failure by other organisations
 15 to pay sufficient heed to these clearly articulated
 16 concerns by The Acorns School.

17 I have noted two lapses by The Acorns School.
 18 Firstly, there was a failure to provide AR's school
 19 internet browser history to Prevent, as had been
 20 intended and, second, the school could have made a
 21 further Prevent referral. Overall, however, I have
 22 concluded that The Acorns School reacted to the grave
 23 problems presented by AR in a notably impressive manner.

24 Although AR's final school, Presfield School,
 25 missed opportunities to become informed about his risks

1 to others, this was of no causative effect because,
 2 despite Presfield School's efforts, AR barely attended.
 3 However, the evidence reveals clear deficiencies in the
 4 way risk information was shared between schools at the
 5 time. I have been reassured that Presfield School has
 6 since taken remedial action, which steps no doubt will
 7 need to be replicated more widely. Lancashire County
 8 Council failed in its obligation, over a substantial
 9 period of time, to investigate AR's prolonged absences
 10 from school or to consider the best means of addressing
 11 his educational needs by way of alternative schooling.

12 The totality of these overarching problems and my
 13 conclusions in relation to the individual agencies
 14 outlined, as I have already indicated, in far greater
 15 detail in the two volumes of the Report, lead me to two
 16 principal conclusions. First, the attack on 29 July
 17 would not have occurred if AR's parents had reported to
 18 the authorities the full extent of what they knew in
 19 late July, including on the day of the attack. Second,
 20 if the relevant agencies individually and collectively
 21 had properly managed and responded to the known danger
 22 that he posed to others from December 2019 onwards, it
 23 is highly likely that this event would not have
 24 occurred. There would, instead, have been a range of
 25 entirely different outcomes, which would have included

1 committed or in preparation by the perpetrator leading
 2 to significant criminal justice and counter-terrorism
 3 interventions. The perpetrator's violent behaviour was
 4 difficult for his parents to manage in the family's
 5 home. However, they had knowledge that he had purchased
 6 some weapons and they knew he had tried to leave the
 7 house to carry out some form of attack at his old school
 8 just one week prior to the fatal attack, when there was
 9 a real risk that he was armed with a weapon. They also
 10 knew of empty knife packaging once the perpetrator left
 11 the family home on the day of the fatal attack. They
 12 failed to report this to the police or any other
 13 agency."

14 From the date when the Inquiry was formally
 15 authorised by the previous Home Secretary to commence
 16 its work in April last year, we have completed the
 17 entire Phase 1 exercise within 12 months. It has been a
 18 substantial undertaking, only made possible because of
 19 three critical factors. First, I have been supported by
 20 an extraordinarily impressive team who have undertaken a
 21 vast amount of work -- the four counsel to the Inquiry
 22 led by Nicholas Moss King's Counsel, along with the
 23 individual teams working under the Solicitor to the
 24 Inquiry, Caroline Featherstone, and her deputy Ross
 25 Howarth, and the Secretary to the Inquiry, Kate

1 AR being taken into care (as being beyond his parents'
 2 control, which he was), or into custody (for instance,
 3 as a result of his production or attempted production of
 4 the poison ricin).

5 History simply would have taken a different
 6 course. As I have already said, this terrible event
 7 could have been and should have been prevented.

8 The Inquiry's Terms of Reference required me to
 9 cover within this Phase the statutory matters which a
 10 Coroner would conventionally address if the coronial
 11 inquests into the deaths of Alice, Bebe and Elsie were
 12 to be resumed. Within my report, I have provided a
 13 narrative form of conclusion as to each of their deaths
 14 which is as follows, and I quote:

15 "While the sole immediate cause of death was
 16 unlawful killing by the perpetrator, the attack that led
 17 to the death was preventable. There was a serious
 18 failure by a number of relevant agencies over the
 19 preceding years to share risk information about the
 20 perpetrator, assess the risk he posed, and act on that
 21 information in an effective multi-agency way so as to
 22 mitigate the risk. More effective earlier intervention
 23 would probably have led to the perpetrator's fascination
 24 with violence being recognised earlier and more clearly.
 25 This in turn would have revealed earlier criminal acts

1 Anderson, have provided me with utterly invaluable
 2 assistance.

3 Second, the Core Participants have shown the
 4 highest levels of professionalism and co-operation,
 5 frequently having to address complex issues and
 6 questions within a very tight time-frame. I am grateful
 7 for the unwavering and uncomplaining support they have
 8 consistently provided.

9 But thirdly, and pre-eminently, the families of
 10 the deceased, together with the other victims and their
 11 families, have offered me and my team a level of
 12 encouragement and understanding without which we would
 13 have been unable to complete our task on time or with
 14 the level of confidence that has been achieved. It goes
 15 without saying that I am greatly indebted to them and
 16 their legal advisers.

17 This stage of the Inquiry has consistently had the
 18 victims and their families at its core: indeed, this
 19 entire exercise has principally been to ensure that the
 20 true history to this terrible event has been laid bare
 21 for their understanding, without anything being held
 22 back or ignored. We have attempted to shine a
 23 penetrating light on everything of relevance that
 24 happened in the months and years leading up to 29 July
 25 2024. I strongly believe that this exercise, by

1 revealing the detail of the numerous and significant
2 mistakes and omissions, has demonstrated that steps can
3 realistically be taken that will greatly reduce the risk
4 of this appalling event ever being repeated in the
5 future, certainly as regards violence-fixated
6 individuals who are known to pose a real risk of
7 inflicting serious harm. I cautiously express the hope
8 that the victims have found this a worthwhile
9 undertaking.

10 We will now turn immediately to Phase 2, in which
11 we will address certain overarching issues, along with
12 others of particular difficulty which will require more
13 detailed consideration than could have been achieved in
14 Phase 1. I have been informed that the Home Secretary
15 will release the Phase 2 Terms of Reference today, and
16 I hope to conclude Phase 2 within a similar time-frame
17 to Phase 1.

18 Finally, and of the highest importance, we should
19 conclude Phase 1 of this Inquiry by focusing our
20 thoughts on the deceased, the other victims and all
21 their families. I ask that in just a moment we all
22 stand for a minute's silence to pay tribute to the three
23 young girls who were killed, Alice, Bebe and Elsie, and
24 to all those who were physically and psychologically
25 injured (some very gravely, with truly significant

1 enduring consequences), and to their families whose
2 lives have been irreparably changed.
3 Would you all please stand.
4 *(One minute's silence observed)*
5 Thank you all very much.
